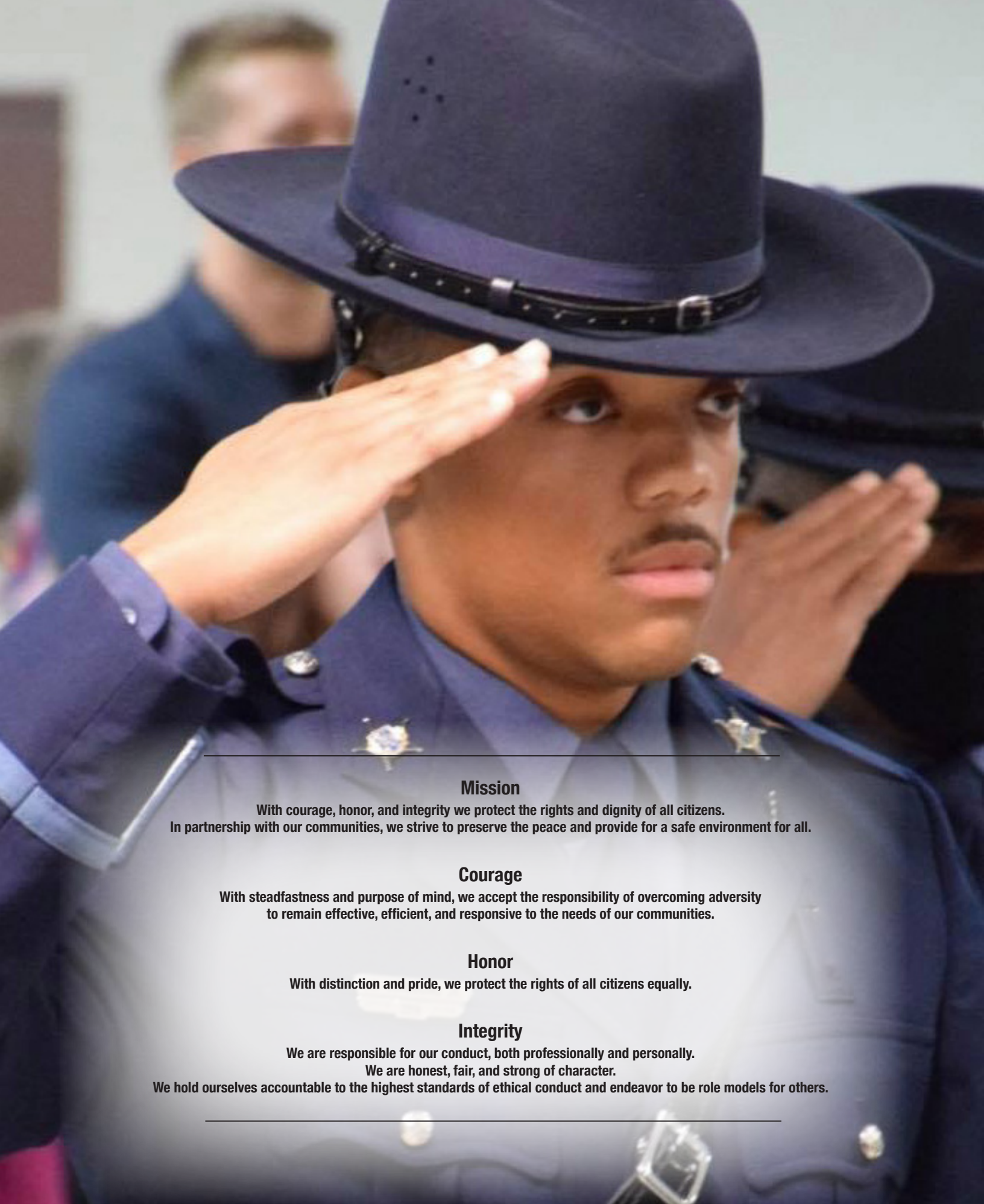

A Message from Sheriff Gahler



To our Harford County Community,

As I reflect on 2020, I would like to take this opportunity to extend my sincere appreciation to each member of the Harford County Sheriff's Office and our many community partners for staying the course during a very tumultuous period making this another incredible year!

2020 concluded with our 5th straight year of Part One crime reductions. Crime reductions don't happen by accident, nor is just one person responsible. The entire Agency had a hand in the reductions, and every member of the Sheriff's Office has cause to be proud. The safety of our communities is our primary mission and it is why the Harford County Sheriff's Office exists, to serve and to protect.

This success is even more notable as this was accomplished as our Sheriff's Office simultaneously balanced the public safety needs of our citizens against the challenges presented by the COVID-19 pandemic and the anti-law enforcement sentiment that seemed to take hold across the Nation, even bringing protests to our front door.

Another notable accomplishment was realized by working with County Executive Glassman and his Administration, the Deputy Sheriff's Union, and the Harford County Correctional Association. Working collectively, we were able to accomplish what was always thought to be an impossible goal. At the outset of Fiscal Year 2021 (this past July), every position and rank in the Sheriff's Office was funded at a market rate (comparative and competitive) as determined by an independent salary and benefits study. This will allow us to recruit and retain the best possible candidates to this profession and to serve Harford County.

Once again in 2020, the efforts and dedication of the Harford County Sheriff's Office were not only recognized internally; the hard work and commitment of some was noted at the state and the national level. Our Victim Services Unit, comprised of Debbie Bradley and Kara Dager, was the recipient of the 2020 National Sheriffs' Association's (NSA) Crime Victim Services Award. This is now three years in a row that the work of your Sheriff's Office has been nationally recognized by the NSA! In addition, Harford County was recognized by the National Association of Counties (NACO) with an award for our Pledge Program. The Pledge Program was the initiative of Sgt. Aaron Penman and our Community Policing Unit, working in partnership with the Office of Drug Control Policy. The Program's sole purpose is to educate children at the elementary school level about the dangers associated with substance abuse.

At the state level, three members of your Sheriff's Office were recognized from among all sheriff's deputies in the entire State, by the Maryland Sheriffs' Association (MSA). The awardees were DFC Andrew Sampson as the MSA Deputy of the Year for Crime Prevention, Cpl. Robert Todd as the MSA Deputy of the Year for Traffic Safety, and receiving the Association's highest recognition, DFC Brittany Baldwin, who was awarded the MSA's Medal of Honor. This was a job well done by each member.

One other important note to mention would be the formation of the Sheriff's Community Board. Although the formation of the Board began in 2019, the group took shape and began meeting in 2020. The Sheriff's Community Board is a volunteer group of concerned and engaged citizens and officials who commit their time and talents to promote public safety in Harford County. The formation of this workgroup is a first for the Sheriff's Office and represents exactly the type of openness and transparency so many claim does not exist in public safety.

As the provider of so many public safety services here in Harford County, the past year has presented the Sheriff's Office with many unexpected challenges, but, as your Sheriff, I could not be more proud of the way each member stepped up and carried our Office and our citizens through these trying times. This is why I count myself truly fortunate, and indeed privileged, to work and serve among such an exceptional group of men and women and for the support of such an amazing community.

National Sheriffs' Association - 2020 Crime Victim Services Award



The Harford County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) started its Victim Services Unit (VSU) in the late 1990's. The VSU works with victims of all Part 1 Crimes and their direct

services include victims of the following crimes/incidents: Homicide and Attempted Homicide, Rape and Attempted Rape, Sex Offenses, Unattended Deaths, SIDS/SUDI Deaths, Home Invasions, Serious Assaults, Robbery and Attempted Robbery, Police Involved Shootings, Overdose Deaths, Accidental Deaths, Suicides, Abductions and Attempted Abductions, False Imprisonment, Hostage/Barricade Situations, Fatal Motor Vehicle Crashes, and Fatal Fires. The VSU is available for on-call crisis response services 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and 365 days a year. Victim Advocates can respond directly to the crime scene or hospital to assist victims/survivors, provide trauma-informed services and make death notifications. In 2019, VSU received a total of 271 reports and assisted 779 victims of crime or violence. VSU also responded to 59 callouts, providing crisis response to 197 victims. Finally, VSU conducted 10 hours of community outreach and provided 35 hours of instruction.

The VSU is staffed by Victim Advocates, Ms. Debbie Bradley and Ms. Kara Dager. Ms. Bradley holds a B.A.Sc. in Criminal Justice and has served as the

HCSO's Victim Services Coordinator for over sixteen years. As an employee of the HCSO since 2005, in 2009, Ms. Dager took a new position to start the Trauma Recognition and Coordination (TRAC) program with grant assistance from GOCCP under the Children's Justice Act (CJAC) grant. The goal of TRAC is to utilize contact of the HCSO deputies during their normal duties to identify children who have been a direct or indirect victim of crime or violence. In 2019, TRAC reviewed 771 cases for referral to additional resources.

In summary, the VSU provides a robust array of services which daily benefit the victims of crimes in our community. The individuals making up the VSU, Ms. Bradley and Ms. Dager, are hardworking, dedicated, and accomplished in their field. Their efforts and perseverance have helped see Harford County through some of its darkest days and they continue to serve the citizens of our jurisdiction and beyond.

Sergeant Grant Krulock is an outstanding and dedicated member of the Harford County Sheriff's Office who has repeatedly been recognized for his outstanding efforts and contributions to the Office and the citizens of Harford County. Sergeant Krulock has been a member of the Office since October 11, 2004. Through his diligent efforts and tenacity of purpose, Sergeant Krulock's professional competence has manifested itself in exemplary performance. His determination and passion for his job has earned him the respect of his supervisors, peers and subordinates. Under his leadership, members of the specialized units he commands have consistently strived to perform above expectations and better themselves and the relationships with the other agencies they work with. In 2019, deputies under his command authored more than 28 residential search and seizure warrants and 32 cellphone warrants; recovered 37 firearms and more than \$31,000 in U.S. currency; recovered more than 44 pounds of cocaine, 4 pounds of marijuana and 25 grams of heroin, worth a combined street value of \$1.8 million. Lastly, his subordinates have arrested more than 75 suspected criminals in 2019. Without a doubt, Sergeant Krulock's dedication and tenacity makes Harford County a safer place to live.

The history of our proud agency dates back 247 years as the Office was first established as a result of the act of the Maryland General Assembly in 1773, which divided Baltimore County into two counties. A new county, Harford, was created from the northeastern quadrant of the former Baltimore County. The actual formation of government for Harford County occurred on March 22, 1774, when Henry Harford sent his commission to the new County Seat at Harford Town. The Right Honorable Henry Harford, Lord Proprietor of the Province, commissioned Thomas Miller the first sheriff.

The first election for sheriff was in 1777, when John Taylor won over his opponent, George Bradford. Although the first sheriff was appointed in 1774, subsequent sheriffs were elected. Sheriffs served two-year terms until 1914 when they began serving four-year terms.

The duties of sheriff throughout the United States vary both internally and externally, and from agency to agency. Depending on the region, some sheriff's offices provide only court and/or correctional services, while others provide law enforcement.

The citizens of Harford County benefit from having a multi-service agency that provides

all three. Although patrol deputies and investigators are the most visible members of the Sheriff's Office, court services deputies and correctional deputies from the Detention Center are critical components of this full-service agency.

Today, As the primary law enforcement agency in Harford County and the largest full-service sheriff's office in the State of Maryland, the Harford County Sheriff's Office is responsible for providing court services, law enforcement, and correctional services to the County's ever-growing population. Sheriff Jeffrey R. Gahler, the 80th Sheriff to serve in Harford County, oversees a workforce of more than 600 sworn and civilian personnel, control an overall budget of \$90,364,541.

Court Services

The Court Services Division is comprised of sworn deputies, temporary employees and civilian personnel. The employees in the division are assigned to several units within the division and tasked with many different duties. An overview of these varied missions are:

- Civil Unit

The mission of the Civil Unit is to serve all processes for District Court and Circuit Court. This includes the receiving, processing, entering, service and return of all court paperwork from in and outside of Harford County.



- Warrant Unit

The Harford County Sheriff's Office Warrant Apprehension / Fugitive Unit investigates leads to locate and apprehend wanted subjects throughout Harford County and surrounding jurisdictions.

- Megan's Law

Megan's Law Unit, which handles the sex offender registry for Harford County, MD. Members ensure sex offenders maintain compliance with routine registration and verification.

- Court Security Unit

It is the duty of the Sheriff under Common Law and the Maryland constitution to provide security of the Circuit Court Courthouse. Their mission is to maintain physical security of the courthouse as well as provide protection for the judges and juries. They must also provide a safe environment for visitors and staff.

- County Security Unit

Their mission is to provide security for the Harford County government building as well as the county council chambers building. These Deputies provide a safe and secure environment for all staff as well as citizens visiting the building for various functions of the county government.

- Records Unit

Records serves as the central point for data entry, compiling and coordinating court documents, police reports, arrest case files, expungements and criminal history information.

- Child Support Administration Unit

We received 688 summonses from the courts and served 540 of them for a service percentage of 78.48%. We received 64 child support warrants and served 36, but in 2020, a total of 52 warrants were recalled by the courts. Between the recalls and actual warrants served, our service rate is considered 100%.

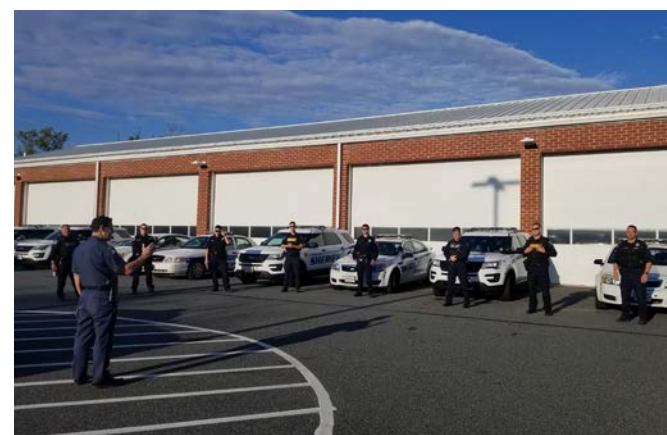

Criminal Investigations Division

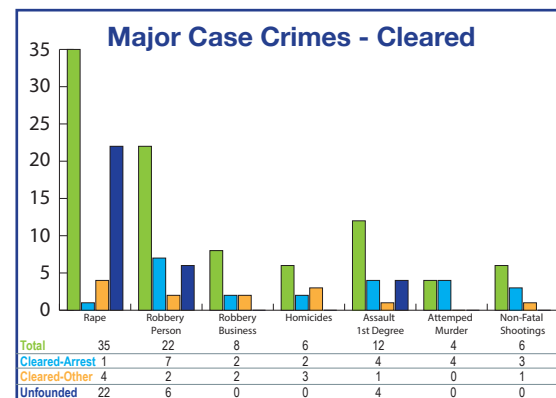
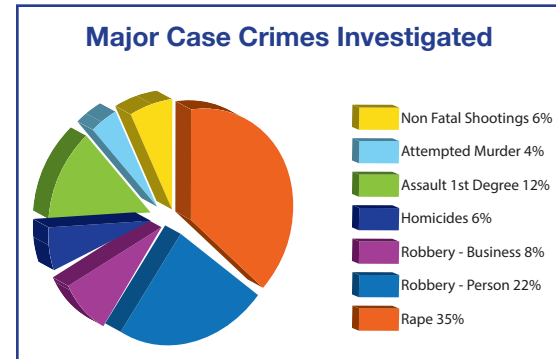

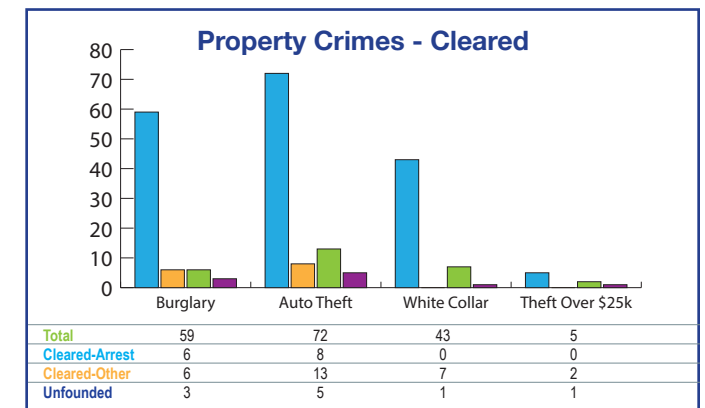
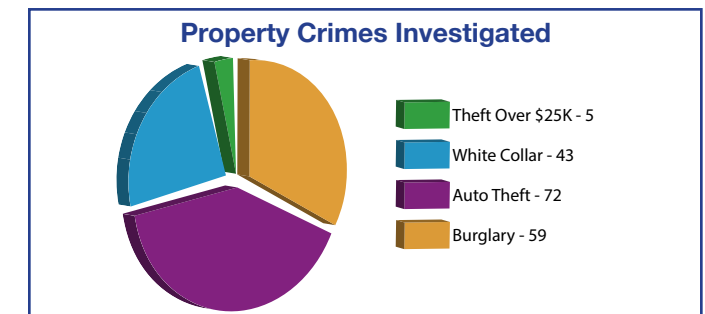
- Forensic Services Unit

FSU is responsible for all forensic requests for both digital evidence, as well as physical evidence to include latent prints, photo arrays, tool marks, and crime scenes.



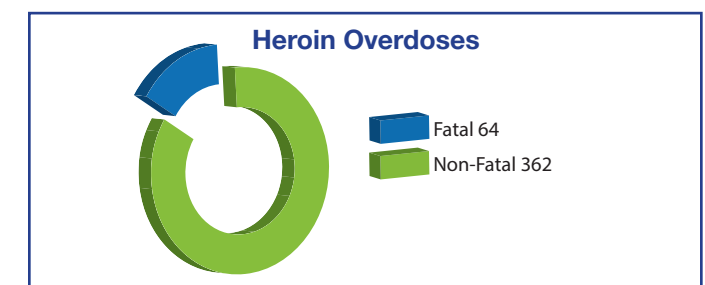
- Property Management Unit (PMU)

In 2020, PMU took in over five thousand (5,652) pieces of unique evidence, conducted audits throughout the year to reduce excess inventory and improve accountability, and helped to implement new property submission protocol.



Special Investigations Division

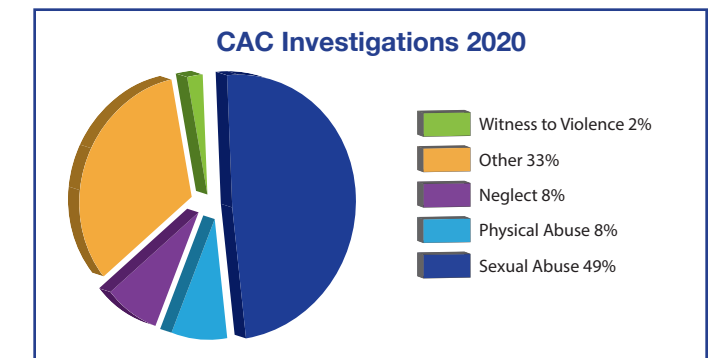
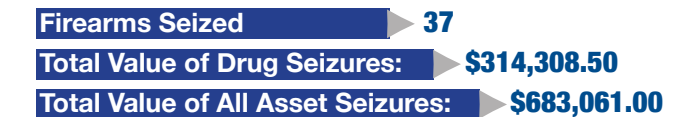
Provides investigative services, both overt and covert, to support the Agency's mission of achieving public safety by improving the quality of life for the citizens of Harford County. Enforces controlled dangerous substance laws through the investigation, identification, infiltration and dismantling of drug trafficking organizations operating within Harford County and surrounding jurisdictions. The division includes special investigative groups that focus on drug task force investigations. SID had 79 new cases for 2020 and 196 continued investigations.

The predecessor to the Harford County Detention Center was the jail. The original jail was constructed in 1791. This jail consisted of three floors, each with six double – bunked cells per floor, one cell for females, and one for juveniles. Meals were prepared on site by the Sheriff's wife and served on a small metal tray. The old jail served as a pre-sentence holding facility only. During the mid-1960's, the agency had three jailers, who also served as police radio operators. Religious and family visits were the only services offered at the time.

The Harford County Detention Center opened in 1973 with a capacity of 100 inmates. Alterations and additions were constructed over the years with the last expansion opening in 1997, increasing the capacity to 474. Thirty-three beds are considered temporary housing and are not included in the capacity total. Those beds are reserved for classification housing, isolation, and medical cells. The latest expansion was completed in 2011, which added 288 beds to the facility for a total capacity of 762.

Classification:

The Harford County Detention Center utilizes specific criteria to provide for inmate classification in terms of custody level required, housing assignment, and participation in facility programs. The inmate classification plan shall specify criteria and procedures for determining and changing the status of an inmate, including custody.

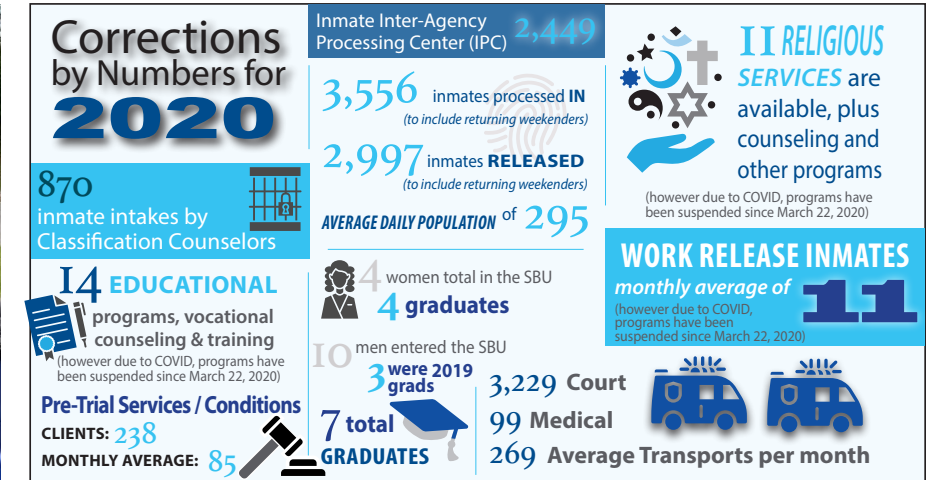
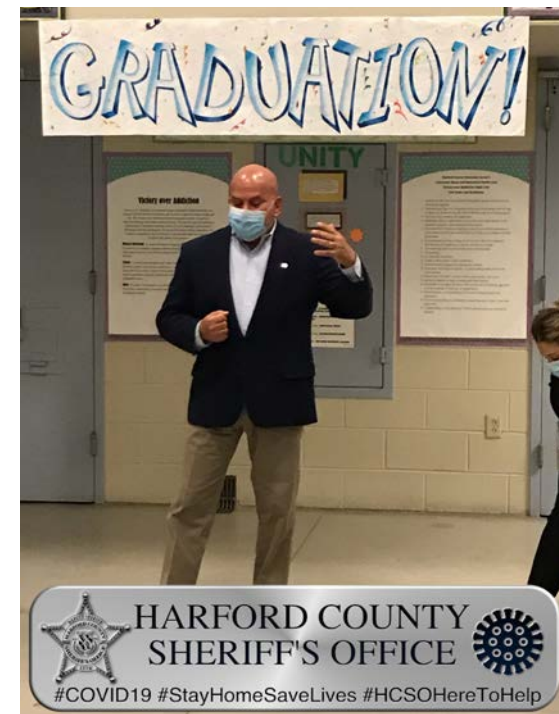
The Harford County Detention Center maintains a library within the security area for inmate use. Library services will meet the educational, informational, and recreational needs of the inmate population as assessed by the Harford County and Facility Librarians. Library services and access to legal materials shall be made available to all inmates, including inmates on segregation, medical isolation and isolation/observation.

Chaplain:

The Harford County Detention Center provides the opportunity of religious counseling, structured group, and individual worship and Bible study for voluntary participation. Inmates housed in segregation shall have access to religious guidance through the Facility Chaplain and religious volunteer members. Inmates shall have the right to practice the religion of choice, subject only to limitations for maintenance of facility security and order.

Pre-Trial:

The Harford County Detention Center Pre-Trial Services Program assists Judicial Officers in maximizing the pretrial release of defendants, while focusing on community safety, and defendants' appearance at trial.



Transportation:

Transportation Unit members provides for the safe and secure transport of prisoners to and from the Harford County Detention Center to ensure the security of the prisoner, and safety of the Transportation Officer, inmate, and public.

Substance Abuse Behavioral Health Program (SBU)

The Harford County Detention Center provides a program for individuals struggling with addiction. This is a 10 week intensive treatment program, which includes daily group therapy and weekly individual sessions, in addition to other community based programs. These therapy programs are evidence based, and focus on preventing the use of alcohol and drugs by learning how to live a lifestyle that is conducive to recovery.

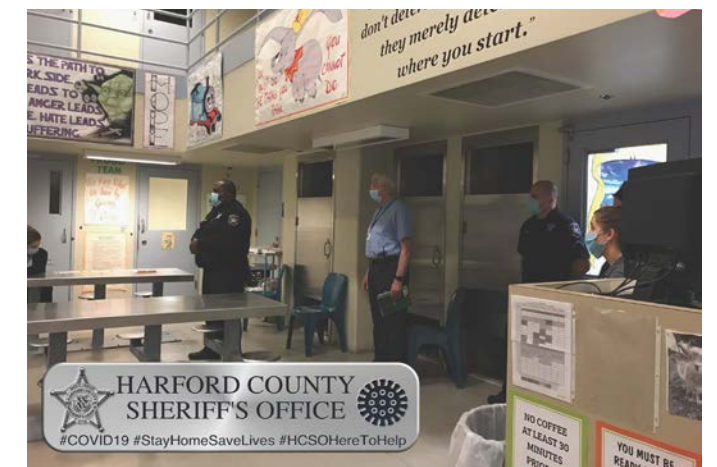
This program will help assist individuals struggling from the disease of addiction by correcting maladaptive thought patterns, identifying triggers, and focusing on relapse prevention, all in effort to reduce recidivism and maintain long term recovery.

IPC/Booking:

The Harford County Detention Center Inter-Agency Processing Center (IPC) conducts booking, fingerprinting, photographing, and assistance with initial appearances of adult arrestees before District Court Commissioners for all law enforcement agencies with Harford County.

Work Release:

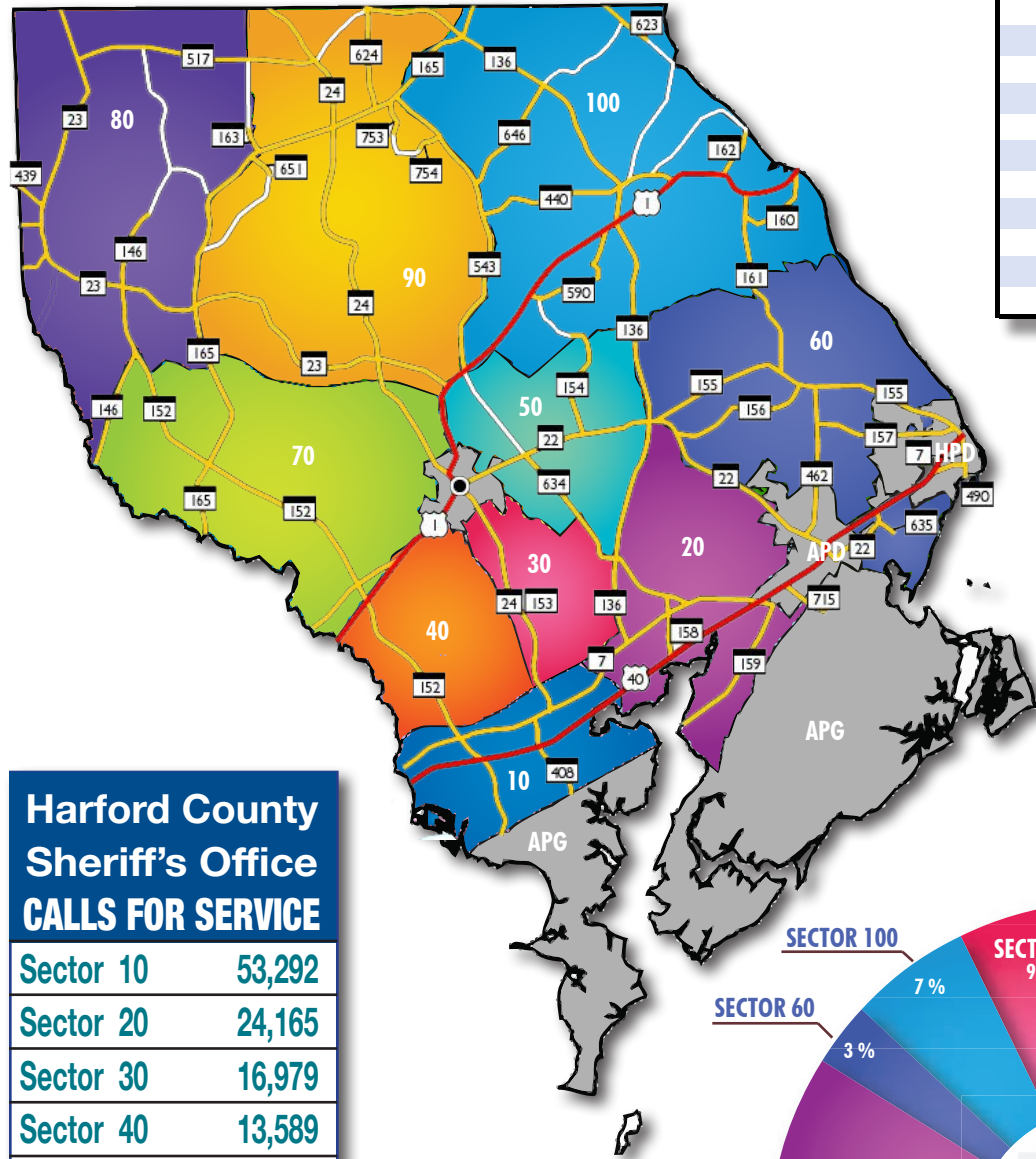
The Harford County Detention Center provides the opportunity for inmates to participate in the Work or Education Release Program. Prior to participation, the inmate shall receive work or education release eligibility from the courts.





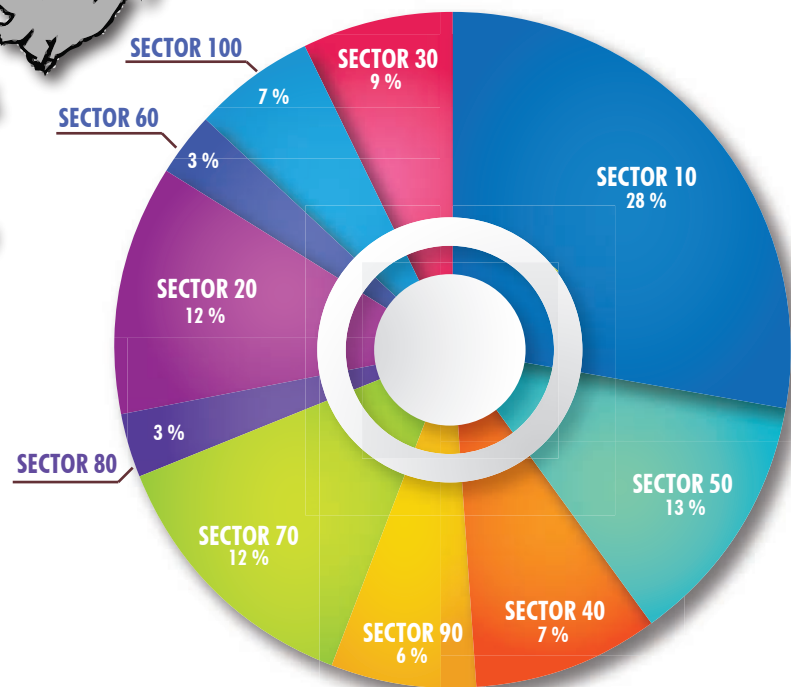

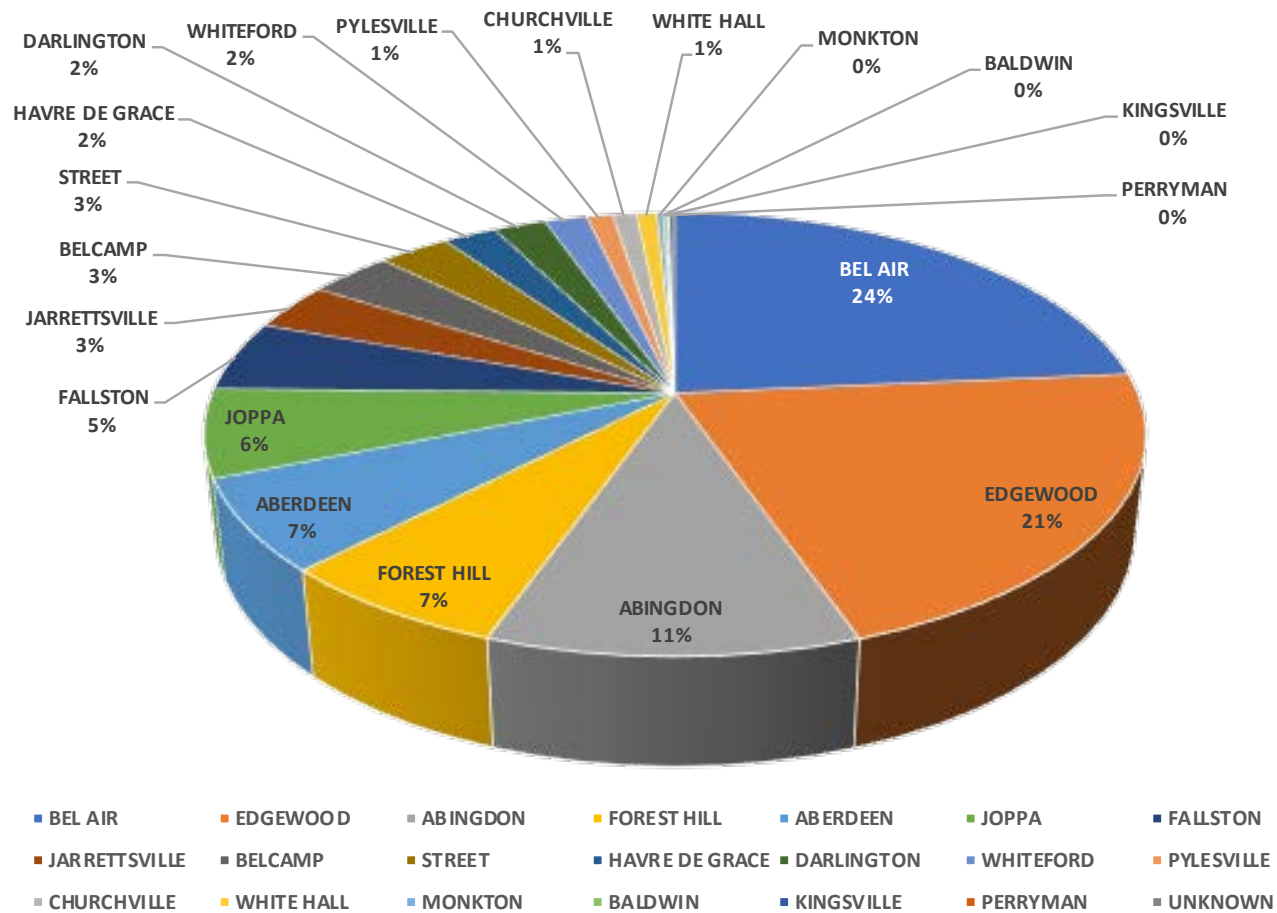

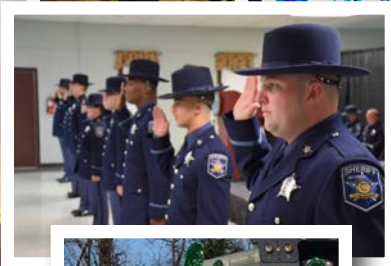
